Videographers: This is the one place where signing up gets you a free registration. If you have experience as a videographer and are interested contact <u>Tom Lawson</u> or our own <u>Steve Walgrave</u> Tom is the national lead on videographers, and Steve Walgrave is the local lead.

Video Moving Crew: Two rooms at the Symposium are set up to live stream the demonstrations. During the breaks between demonstrations, we need to move the "old" demonstrator out of the video room and move the next demonstrator's tools into the video room. This is a good place to volunteer because you don't miss any demonstrations and you get to deal directly with the demonstrators.

Companion Craft Area: If your spouse will be at the Symposium, we have a couple of areas that they can help with if they like keeping busy. If your spouse is craft oriented, we have a space for spouses to meet and work on craft projects. They can help organize projects or just be a good host to out of town spouses.



APRIL OPEN SHOP REVIEW · DAVE WOOD

Open Shop this month was very busy. So busy that I forgot to take pictures of all the people who came. My wife counted 23 cars in the parking area, and there were a few more that came and went.

We had new first-time members, prospective new members, plenty of current members (including Fred, the official woodturning Open Shop dog), and a visitor from the Arts Council Lake Oswego. There were lots of smiles and good conversations. Several of the lathes were in use, the grinders were sharpening, and store sales were brisk. In other words, it was what an Open Shop is supposed to be!











The "coring" demonstration was done at 10:00 am. A large piece of Big Leaf Maple (19.5" in diameter by 7" thick) was mounted on the 20" Powermatic lathe with the circumference rounded, and the face surface smoothed. The blank was cut with a large tenon for 5" dovetail jaws. A bigger tenon is required because of the weight of this large piece of wood (125 lbs!), and because coring applies a lot of torque on the tenon. Oneway's Easy Core system was used for the actual coring process.

My homemade positioning fixture (copper pipe I had for making tool handle ferrules, and a \$15 laser pointer from Office Depot held securely by blue tape) allows me to quickly tighten down the cutter baseplate at the proper distance from the face of the wood, and to set the diameter, using the 10% of diameter rule for the wall thickness of the roughed bowl.

APRIL OPEN SHOP REVIEW . (CONT'D)







By swinging the positioning fixture in the arc of the cutting arm, the laser beam shows where the bottom of the bowl will be, and where the rim of the bowl will be. Once the setup is done and checked, the smallest bowl is cut first, then the next larger, and so on. We got four bowls out of this particular piece of wood. The largest is the last one and makes a great jam chuck for cutting the tenons and rounding the sharp edges on the smaller bowls.

With all the edges rounded, the roughed blanks labeled for wood type and date, and
















the AnchorSeal applied, the blanks are put away to dry for a year or so. The figure in this Big Leaf Maple was pretty wild and swirly with end grain everywhere, so we waxed these bowls entirely.

The next Open Shop is May 11. Mark your calendar now so you don't miss it. We'll have another demo on a different topic yet to be determined. See you here!

SHARPENING CLASS REVIEW · DAVE WOOD



April 4th Sharpeners Develop "Keen" Edges

We opened the 2Q training class sequence on April 6th with the **Sharpening Lathe Tools** course. Mike Meredith took the lead and taught about the key focus areas for the day: Tool Steels; Grinding Equipment; the Mechanics of Sharpening; Free-Hand Sharpening; Honing; and Handy Tools and Gadgets.

The class included Betsy Benoit, Dave Fisk, Ron Dixon, Karl Eckweiler, Roger Klick, and Mark Maher. Coaching assistants were Skip Burke, Parley Savage, Mark McNamara, and Dave Wood. Instead of a big pile of

wood shavings, we created a small layer of grinding dust, so clean-up was easy and quick!

Learning how to turn wood is harder if your tools aren't ground to the proper profile for the task at hand, and it's especially harder if the tools are not sharp. That's why this is the first class in our training course sequence. Sharp tools are safer tools, and properly ground tools make learning easier and quicker. Dull, or improperly shaped, tools can lead to frustration and accidents.

As Mike likes to say, "If you can see the cutting edge, you still don't have one".









We teach sharpening on the Oneway Wolverine system, but we do familiarize students with other systems, such as, Tormek and Kodiak during the class. We also discussed the features and benefits of traditional aluminum oxide grinding wheels vs. the new and very popular cubic boron nitride (CBN) wheels.





Honing is not a widely used sharpening technique in the woodturning world, but there is a time and place when it comes to tuning up a skew or a spindle gouge for the finest finish cut. Students got to try their hand honing their skews.

SHARPENING CLASS REVIEW · (CONT'D)

In a sense, any tool sharpened on a platform is mostly free-hand sharpened – tools like scrapers, skews, and parting tools. However, we don't spend a lot of time in class on free-hand sharpening gouges. Their 3-dimensional cutting edge makes free-hand sharpening more challenging. We gave this class a demonstration, on a 40/40 bowl gouge and a spindle gouge, as a taste for their future skill development.

Everybody finished the day having learned about bevel angles, wing lengths, scraper burrs, grinding wheels, slow-speed grinders, M2–, M42–, and V10 steels, flute shapes, grinder setup tools, and gadgets.







We even learned that the English label a 5/8" gouge as a 1/2" gouge... and we still wonder why.

But then, that's just one more good reason we came across the Atlantic in the first place!

NWWT EDUCATION PROGRAM UPDATE · DAVE WOOD

By the numbers...

The education program is on track for 2024 to date, with 31 students attending our classes in the first quarter. By the end of this week, we will have completed the Sharpening, Basic Spindles, and Basic Bowls classes adding another 20 students to the tally, and another 14 are expected for the 201 Project Classes in early June. It is rare that we do not fill a turning class with seven students. The Sharpening classes are limited to six students based on our experience with the space needed for grinding stations. Our scheduled maximum number of training slots for each year is 102 in the normal education program. Extra events, such as we had with Stuart Batty last year, are in addition to the 102.

The schedule for the fourth quarter classes will be added to the website in the next few days. Until then, mark your calendars with the following dates. We have tried to avoid all the potential conflicts that we know about or could think of, but we're only human!

The Instructor Corps...

We now have 24 NWWT club members serving on our "faculty" for training classes. With our aggressive training program's 1:1 coaching philosophy, we use all of them – several times each year. In fact, we could use more coaches and instructors, and we're always pursuing our goal of developing more instructors and coaches. If you are interested, contact Dave Wood for more information.

Our Curriculum...



The scope of our classes is beginner and intermediate skill levels. Currently, NWWT does not plan to create and conduct more advanced level classes, as we feel there are a number of professional schools around the country that already do that very well.

Additionally, as we have in the past, NWWT will host nationally known instructors to come and teach additional classes as opportunities arise.

Our five courses have not changed this past year and will likely continue into 2025 as is.

Of course, we are always looking for ways to improve, and we continually update our course content as new tools, information, and techniques are developed.

NWWT EDUCATION PROGRAM UPDATE · (cont'd)

Our courses are:

- 1) **Sharpening Lathe Tools** for beginners and more advanced turners.
- 2) **Spindle Turning Basics** targeted at beginning woodturners, or as a refresher course.
- 3) **Bowl Turning Basics** targeted at beginning woodturners, or as a refresher course.
- 4) Spindle Turning 201 Project Class targeted at intermediate skill level woodturners.
- 5) **Bowl Turning 201 Project Class** targeted at intermediate skill level woodturners.

And lastly, the transition in education management...

As I assume responsibilities as Vice President, we are transitioning responsibility for training to a committee of three members, who will work with me to learn the ins and outs of our education program. The education committee will report to me at least through the next year or so, and then we will evaluate to see the next steps.

The three members and their basic duties are listed below with the qualifier that some activities are still in flux as we work our way through the process:

Aaron Bloom

- Keeper of the course text documents. Responsible for keeping them current and updated as needed.
- · Aaron will eventually assume management of the website for classes, blast emails, etc.

Stuart Pemble-Belkin

• Stuart is the Instructor/Coach recruiter for all classes (and Open Shops if needed).

Parley Savage

• Parley assembles the class binders for each class.

We have already begun, and activities so far are running smoothly.

Please feel free to contact me anytime if you have questions or comments.

And a big thank you to all who make this program successful for the Northwest Woodturners.

The annual Gathering of the Guilds show took place last month at the Oregon Convention Center. This show operates in conjunction with the Ceramics Showcase each year and attracts well over 10,000 visitors each year. There are six guilds in the show covering woodworking, metal arts, glass, beading, handweavers, and ceramics.

The Guild of Oregon Woodworkers represents all of the woodworkers at the show and does a lot of the work planning the event and coordinating the several booths for individuals and smaller groups at the show.

Our club rents a booth for members to showcase their work. All of the fees for the show are paid for out of the sales at the show. This was another great year in the booth with over \$8,000 in sales. That total was a slight increase to last year. With so many people at the show, admiring the craftsmanship of the members of our club, there is also plenty of opportunity to share what we do as an organization.





In the past, Roger Crooks has been an integral part of bringing this show to life. It was a big adventure for me to jump in late in the game to coordinate our club booth.

We had five members showcase in our booth; Roger Moore, Miguel Hernandez, Jim Schoeffel, Bill Giffin, and me. Everyone did well, sales wise, but the show is also a huge ego boost. Hundreds, if not thousands, of people stop by the booth during the three days, and they all comment on how amazing each of our work is. I was feeling pretty good about myself by the end, and it has been good for me to look at the work of some of the others, even here in our club, and see how much I still have to learn and develop.

Selling your work is not for everyone, just as not every demo from a monthly meeting will be for everyone. There is a lot to be said for simply enjoying woodturning without the complications of trying to sell.

The club has been doing three shows per year – Multnomah Days in August, Guilds in the Village during the holidays, and Gathering of the Guilds in April. Each show creates an opportunity that is a different way to learn about the selling side of our craft. If you are interested in learning more, please feel free to reach out. NWWT WOOD CZAR · MARK McNAMARA



Not much to report for this last month's wood gathering activities. As spring gets into full swing, wood gathering for the club will probably slow down.

The warmer temperatures and lower humidity of the summer and fall months makes preserving fresh cut wood a real challenge. When the air has more humidity, the gradient between moisture in the log and that in the air is lower, leading to less moisture loss from the log. Higher temperatures only exacerbates the issue and as the rings lose moisture at different rates, this causes shrinkage at different rates, resulting in the cracks or checking we work so hard to avoid.

Anecdotally, I've noticed that fruit wood cut during the active growth season warps more during the drying process than if the tree was cut down in the fall or winter after the leaves have fallen. I'd love to hear from anyone that can confirm or refute that.

I've been gathering my own logs for wood turning for about five years, and in the last year of being the "wood czar" I've still learned a whole lot about the cyclical nature of working with green wood.

Fall and winter are ideal times to be out collecting fresh wood, roughing bowls or just keeping those logs whole or cutting the pith out for safe keeping. Spring and summer are a time to finish turn roughed out bowls and turning any whole logs you have sitting around before the hotter months arrive.

On that note, we still have a huge selection of green wood over at Dave Wood's shop. Go pick up some wood before the leaner days of summer are upon us and get that stuff rough turned!


