Turning Classes

We just finished our last round of classes. We will take the summer off and start up our next series this fall. When available, the next series will be published on our <u>Calendar</u>. We have a new webpage explaining our series of five classes <u>HERE</u>. We have three Basics classes - Bowl, Spindle and Sharpening plus two Intermediate classes - Bowls and Spindles. Our goal is to run the series once a quarter with the summer off.

Just a reminder, classes sell out quickly so, if interested, signup and if the class is full, join the waitlist as people drop off at the last minute. Please note – registration must be paid for within 15 minutes or else your registration will be canceled, and you will need to register again. We also have set a 3-student minimum requirement to hold a class. (It's never been a problem to date!)

Open Shop

Our next Open Shop is **April 9** (generally the second Saturday of every month). Register <u>HERE</u>. Registering will reserve a lathe for you, but all are welcome to come and just chat or sharpen your tools. If you are on the waitlist, you are still welcome and encouraged to come to socialize, sharpen, talk, or turn if a lathe frees up. Our helpers are there to work with members, giving valuable one-on-one help plus sharpening tips for all your tools. Take advantage of this key member benefit!

Open Shop is free, but that does not mean it does not cost the club money. We rent a portable restroom for the day, have lots of coffee and doughnuts, and Dave's electric bill has gone way up, especially in winter. Open Shop will remain free, but we will have a donation bowl out for anyone that would like to contribute (cash or credit card) to the event.

BETTER BOWLS TOMORROW PROJECT · STEVEN COLLETT

COMMUNITY SERVICE UPDATE – Better Tomorrow Bowls Project

As part of the Northwest Woodturners Association goal to serve our community by building projects for the public good – we have started a program to provide quality, keepsake wood fruit/salad bowls to public assistance agencies.

Specifically, the "Better Tomorrow Bowls" project is partnering with three local agencies that are involved with helping families and individuals in crisis transition to better lives.

These organizations serve families and individuals dealing with issues of homelessness, addiction, domestic violence, poverty, education, mental and physical heath, and unemployment to find safety, hope, and independence.

We have the opportunity to help by providing up to 30 wood bowls per month for these agencies to give to their clients as they transition from crises situations to better futures.

Who? All members!!

What? Bowls can be any species, construction or design you want to make or have already made with the following suggestions:

- 11" to 14" diameter
- 3" to 6" depth
- Food safe finish (walnut oil preferred or similar safe oil finish)
- Signature on bottom (i.e., John Smith of NWWT / wood species / year)

How? Donations can be dropped off at any of the open shops, classes, and other events or arrangements can be made by contacting Steve Collett (stevengcollett@gmail.com) to pick up bowls.

When? NOW! 30 bowls a month is 360 bowls a year. That is a reachable goal with over 200 member and everyone donating just two or three bowls over the entire year. If members wanted to donate more than only two or three bowls? Even better, and the goal will be reached even quicker. (One member has already donated seven bowls)

Please help. This is a terrific, simple opportunity to put your woodturning skills to work to directly help those in our communities.

NWWT TRAINING UPDATE · DAVE WOOD

We are well under way with the 2022 training program, having conducted each of our five courses in the first quarter. Our "one-on-one coaching" approach is very popular with students and instructors alike.







Thanks to Phil Lapp's Accent Signs company we now have new signs for each of the five classes, one for Open Shop, and one for general NWWT functions. The recent Intermediate Bowl and Spindle turning classes were very successful. We focused on next-level of expertise bowl finish cuts and the importance of bowl form and design. The spindles group made Easter eggs using the cup-chuck method. But most importantly, they did it all with the much loved, and feared, skew chisel!





Classes coming up soon for the second quarter are as follows:

April 16	Bowl Turning Basics
May 7	Spindle Turning Basics
May 21	Intermediate Bowl Turning
May 22	Intermediate Spindle Turning
June 4	Sharpening Lathe Tools

Each class is open for 6 students and is led by our Instructor Corps team of 4 or 5 instructors and coaches. If you are an advanced turner and are not yet a member of the Instructor Corps and would like to be, please contact Dave Wood for more information. The best way to learn even more and improve your own skills is to teach someone else!

We'll take the summer off and resume training classes in the fall with a repeat of all five courses, completing all before the holiday season gets busy for everyone.

We have had 35 members take training classes so far this year, and 88 attendees at classes since we began in-person classes in October of 2020. The whole experience of bringing



OREGON CARVERS GUILD · ROGER CROOKS

As you get proficient in your woodturning skills, the next step for many people is how to enhance or embellish your work, whether it's a bowl, box, platter, or other item. Coloring can be done with dyes or paint. Pyrography is fun, and options are limitless. But one of the most spectacular enhancements is carving – either by hand or with power tools such as Dremels, micromotors, or a variety of other tools.

Carving options are as varied as the different types of turning. Many turners start thinking about making a pen or a bowl, but as we all know, that is just the tip of the iceberg of what you can do on a lathe.

Carving is the same. There are many specialties in carving that are too numerous to list here. However, for us turners, some very simple carvings can make a huge difference in your piece. You have seen many different carving examples from club members during our monthly Show & Tell presentations.

Carving the outside of a bowl adds a new dimension to your work. Adding color to that work makes a dramatic effect. See photos below.

We have formed the **Oregon Carvers Guild** about a year and half ago, taking over the former Carver's Club that went from several hundred members to about a dozen and with the Carver's Special Interest Group from the Guild of Oregon Woodworkers.

Dues are only \$30, and the vast majority of demos and classes have been free or very low cost. OCG will have a 25' booth at Gathering of the Guilds in May, doing demonstrations and selling some incredible pieces of art created by our members.

I love carving, but my skills are limited which is one reason I joined the OCG board as VP. I encourage you to check us out and join us at <u>oregoncarvers.com</u>.

AAW · ANNUAL CALL FOR BOARD NOMINEES



The AAW Board of Directors

The AAW has a volunteer nine-member Board of Directors to represent the membership and move the organization forward. These members are elected by the AAW members in August each year. Any member in good standing for the past three years is eligible to run, regardless of geographical location.

Becoming a Board Member

Do you have the leadership experience, time, energy, and ideas to be a part of AAW's operations, as well as a willingness to help make it a better organization? Be a part of moving the AAW forward – run for a position on the AAW Board of Directors.

The Board is most effective with a diversity of skills represented. Members with experience, such as working with nonprofit organizations, especially in the areas of finance, strategic planning, nonprofit governance, or legal matters, are especially encouraged to apply. In your candidate statement it is more important to emphasize your business and interpersonal skills rather than your woodturning skills.

After a review of application materials and conducting phone interviews, the Nominating Committee will select six qualified candidates from the applicants. From these six, members will elect two Board members, and the Board will appoint a third Board member, to serve three-year terms beginning the following January.

If you are interested in serving on the Board, send the following information to the Executive Director (phil@woodturner.org) by email no later than May 1st:

- Current resume
- A statement of intent, 300 words or less, including qualifications and reasons for applying. Applications demonstrating past nonprofit organization experience and leadership are highly desirable.
- Letters of recommendation from two individuals who can confirm your organizational and leadership abilities.
- · A high-resolution head-and-shoulders photograph of yourself.

The Nominating Committee will review the application materials and schedule phone interviews in May and early June. Six candidates for the three open Board seats will be presented in the *American Woodturner* journal, along with photos. The AAW will assist the six candidates in producing a brief individual video statement which will be posted to the AAW website. Online voting will occur during the month of August, and election results will be announced in early September.

Approximate Time Involvement


Three face-to-face board meetings each year, expenses paid by the AAW. One Board meeting will be held in conjunction with the AAW Annual International Symposium (normally in June or July), extending the meeting to about 10 days. The other two annual meetings are usually Friday through Sunday afternoon in January and November.

- Two hours or less on a Zoom board meeting call each month.
- · Check e-mail daily.
- Stay current with website information.
- Serve on 2 or 3 committees and chair no more than 2 (see Bylaws). This work runs in spurts but averages about 1 to 3 hours per day.
- Additionally, we believe it the responsibility of a Board member to interact with the AAW membership by attending chapter functions and local symposiums whenever possible.






