





# NWWT EDUCATION PAST AND FUTURE

The education of our members is our primary NWWT mission. With our growing membership, 2022 was our biggest education year ever. We have strong momentum with our training classes supplemented by consistently good participation in Open Shop sessions, where the education continues with a variety of topics as they walk in the door.

My thanks to our veteran woodturner members who are always here and willing to coach. (Were you wondering why we always have the best donuts at our events?)







# The training numbers so far:

We began actively re-structuring and re-energizing our training program in mid-2020 with our initial *Basic Bowl Turning* and *Basic Spindle Turning* classes in the fall of that year. Despite Covid, we were able to hold classes and Open shops in a well-ventilated facility with enough space to be safely separated.

# Continuous improvement is our battle cry!

Initial *Basics* classes were well received, but certainly left room for improvement. The guiding principle of a 1:1 student-to-instructor/coach came out of those early beginner sessions, and we hold to that principle today in our *Basics* classes. I think we will find we can back off that ratio a bit with the 201-level classes as the students taking the 201 classes will have higher skill levels.

The 201 Project Courses, launched this past October, were another evolutionary step in our training program. Feedback from members on our initial *Intermediate Bowl and Spindle Classes* was that they lacked sizzle and excitement. The Instructor Corps members discussed it and found we couldn't argue with our critics, and the 201 Project Courses were born.

Based on the success of the first two sessions, the *Viking Bowl Class* and the *Lidded Box Class*, I can confirm that we are on the right track for more advanced skill level classes that will continue into the years to come with a variety of more challenging and "sizzly" projects.

# Training costs are on the rise - like everything else.

Not only are we dedicated to training members to be better woodturners, we're also committed to doing so at the lowest possible cost to members. 


# Website upgrades for the education program




To register for any class or for an Open Shop event, simply click on the "Register" button for your particular event, as shown below. The website will lead you through the registration steps including your payment via credit card or PayPal.



We all juggle schedules these days, and we understand that every now and then you might need to cancel an event you have registered for and paid for. Cancellation is easier, and much quicker, on the website compared to calling somebody. You simply go into your registration on the website and click on the "Cancel" button in the lower left corner.

Your registration is immediately canceled, your money is immediately credited back to the payment method you used, anyone on the waitlist is automatically added to the class to fill your spot, or an opening shows up immediately on the registration screen for the next person who tries to register.

So, PLEASE use the website to manage your class registrations instead of calling someone. It's faster, more accurate, and automatically takes all the right actions. # SHARPENING · ROGER CROOKS

# Why do gouges and scrapers need to be sharpened so often?

If you are a woodworker using hand planes or chisels, you understand the benefit of sharpness. How often are they sharpened? Maybe once a month if used a lot, sometimes before starting a project. Woodworkers don't think about how many feet a blade travels but if they did, maybe a few hundred feet for planes and for chisels, maybe a few hundred inches.

However, when talking about turning tools, we talk about miles. A 10" platter spinning at 2000 rpm (a bit fast), covers one mile, and depending on the wood and the tool steel, it is probably time to think about hitting the grinder. A scraper works with a fine burr that is quick to form but also quick to go away.

The key question is, how do you know when to sharpen? With experience, the feel of the cut will tell you. When hogging out a bowl, a dull tool will work but you will also work harder than need be. Carbide tools are great for removing lots of wood quickly because you don't care what the surface looks like. A newly sharpened gouge at the end will get rid of all the tear-out.

# Some thoughts:

- **1.** Sharpen before your last cut to get rid of any tear-out or tool marks. It is quicker to sharpen than to sand with 60- or 80-grit sandpaper. The goal is to start with 120- or 180-grit sandpaper.
  - **2.** Sharpen at the start of a project so you get the feel of how a sharp tool cuts.
    - **3.** A really dull tool is dangerous because when you are using a lot of muscle and when pushing hard you can slip and ruin the piece or maybe hit the chuck. Aside from wearing out your hands and arms, it will take more time.
      - **4.** Examine the shavings when using a scraper. If you are getting dust, it is time to refresh the burr. Also, remember to turn the scraper 45 degrees on your last pass for a very fine cut.

**Where** – Linn County Expo Center in Albany, Oregon (about 90 minutes south of Portland).

Cost - \$325

The planning for the 2023 Symposium is well underway. This biennial show was canceled in 2021 due to Covid, but it's back again with a fantastic list of demonstrators and vendors.

#### What It Is

The symposium includes five demonstration rooms, a large vendor area, an Instant Gallery, an auction, and a raffle. Each demo room has four demos on Friday and Saturday, and two on Sunday, so you will be able to see all the demonstrators. A dinner Saturday night is catered and will feature a raffle for a lot of great prizes donated by our vendors.

Albany is an easy drive from Portland, and the facility is well-suited for our event. Two hotels are on-site with reasonable rates.

NWWT will sponsor one of the demo rooms which means we are responsible for outfitting the room with a lathe, grinder, audio/video support, and other items needed by the demonstrator. As a result, NWWT will receive a stipend for that support. Each room has ten demo sessions over the 2 ½ days, and for each demonstration, we will need the support of an A/V operator and an assistant.

#### Why Attend

This is a great opportunity to learn from the best.

There is something for all, from beginners to advanced turners. Beginners will learn how to make the best cuts and advanced turners will see different ways to enhance your work to make it stand out.

You will also see the latest in woodturning equipment, tools, and jigs. Attending the symposium is your chance to be up close and personal with the demonstrators who are very open and easy to talk with. Plus, you will get to see old friends and meet many of the best turners in the area.

# What Is Needed For the NWWT Room

Like our club, the symposium is put on by volunteers, and the symposium is a huge event. Volunteers will receive a symposium t-shirt, and the club will get a stipend depending on how the show finances work out.

#### **NWWT Volunteers Are Needed For:**

- **Setup** Setup is on Thursday, so we need to transport all our equipment to Albany and get it set up.
- **Demo Support** For each of the ten sessions, we provide the A/V support and supply a "helper" who makes sure the room is set up properly and the demonstrators have what they need.
- **Tear-Down** The show ends Sunday at noon at which time we pack up and move our equipment back home.


There continues to be many outstanding library books and CD's that were checked out of the NWWT Library and are now long overdue.


